SPECIAL PRACTICES FOR COVID 19 FOR CREATIVE ARTS EXHIBITS

All exhibitors will be required to fill out a registration form found on our website. This form must be filled out in its entirety and returned with your item(s) on check-in day, Sunday, September 20, 2020. Exhibitor numbers will be automatically generated by our system. If you are not able to register online, you must pick up a registration form and entry tags at your local Extension Office or download and print from our website. www.northwestarkansasdistrictfair.com.

No exhibitor number will be available using the paper form and will be assigned upon arrival at check-in.

All items **MUST BE** tagged and marked with your exhibitor number. All tags **MUST BE** filled out completely and attached securely to your items. Items not tagged or with incomplete tags will not be judged and will not receive a premium check. Tags can be picked up at your local extension office beginning August 17, 2020.

Number of items **per exhibitor** will be limited to **25**. All items must be contained in 1 or 2 boxes per exhibitor with no overhanging items. Large items, like framed art or woodworking projects are the only exception.

Check-in will be drive-thru only. Enter the fairgrounds at Gate 1 and follow the signs to the appropriate drop off site. A staff member will assist you, please do not exit your vehicle. Then follow the signs to exit safely.

Items will be stored for 72 hours before being judged. Exception – Floral and Floral Arrangements will be judged on Monday, September 21. Only the Best of Show/Grands/Reserves will be displayed in the tan building. Building will only be open following judging on Thursday, and from 11am to 4pm on Friday and Saturday. **NOT ALL ITEMS WILL BE ON DISPLAY.**

Check-out will be Sunday, September 27 from 1-4pm by drive thru only. Please do not exit your vehicle.

Special Check-out for Floral and Floral Arrangements will be Tuesday, September 22nd from 3-6pm. The fair board will not be responsible for floral entries remaining on the grounds after this scheduled pick-up time. Premium checks will not be available until Sunday, September 27. Please make arrangements to pickup your check during that time.

Groups/Teachers – Please have your items tagged before arrival to fairgrounds. Buildings will not be available to complete the tagging process.

Entries will be judged on Monday, September 21st. To prevent damage to entries, all items should be removed from the fairgrounds on Tuesday, September 22 from 3-6pm. The fair board will not be responsible for entries remaining on the grounds after this scheduled pick-up time. Premium checks will not be available until Sunday, September 27. Please make arrangements to pickup your check during that time.

1. All plant material must be fresh; no purchased flowers will be accepted.
 2. Clean and groom all plants. Be sure that they are free of diseases, insects and spray residue.
 3. Cut specimens must be displayed in clear container (provided by the exhibitor) of suitable size and stability.
 4. Each specimen should have some of its own foliage. Exceptions are large crested celosia and gladiolus.
 5. No foliage should be under water.
 6. All specimen classes will be judged for cultural perfection; the clear container will not be considered.
 7. Multiple entries of the same specimen/plant type will not be accepted unless clearly belonging in a separate classification. IE: single, double.

Entries will be judged on Monday, September 21st. To prevent damage to entries, all items should be removed from the fairgrounds on Tuesday, September 22 from 3-6pm. The fair board will not be responsible for entries remaining on the grounds after this scheduled pick-up time. Premium checks will not be available until Sunday, September 27. Please make arrangements to pickup your check during that time.

1. Entries should be mature specimens.
 2. A plant grown primarily for its bloom must have blooms present to enter; ie; African violets, gloxinia, orchids, etc.
 3. The judges will not consider the container unless otherwise noted.
 4. Be sure that leaves and trash have been removed from the surface of soil.
 5. Use a size appropriate saucer underneath containers that drain to prevent leakage.
 6. Containers cannot exceed 12" wide.
 7. All plant material must be fresh; no purchased flowers will be accepted.
 8. Clean and groom all plants. Be sure that they are free of diseases, insects, spray residue or dust.

III. Composition – 50 points

Does it follow the Rule of Thirds; what is center of interest; good use of elements of balance, design, color, lines, angles, contrast, depth, framing and focus; is background appropriate; close-up or wide-angle use; are all of the elements composed in a pleasing arrangement.

2. Products exhibited must be in the name of the person who canned them.
3. Exhibits should be labeled with the product, date of food preservation, and method of preservation. Method should state whether processed in water bath, pressure canner, or using another method such as dehydration. For labels, contact County Extension Office or download from <http://uaex.edu/health-living/food-safety/preservation/>. Low acid foods must be pressure canned.
4. Judging will be done by comparison to recognized standards of quality and safety. For a copy of these standards, contact the Extension office.
5. No food coloring of any kind is to be used in any products entered.
6. For judging and safety reasons, jars must be clear glass with Mason-type labels on jar or box. They must have a clean metal lid and ring, vacuum seal, and of acceptable size per recipe instructions. Jars must be sealed. Jar sizes specified on recipes will be accepted which are typically quart, pint, or half-pint.
DRIED FOODS: Jars of any size are not required to be sealed and points will be awarded for each product.
FLAVORED VINEGARS: clear bottle/ jar with closure. Vinegars are not required to be sealed.
JAMS AND JELLIES: No food coloring. All jars must be processed and properly sealed. No paraffin or wax seals. Further instructions found in the jams and jellies section.
